
















































## **52 Years of Chancel Choir Music, Worship and Outreach**

This fall marks the 52nd season of the Chancel Choir. Begun in 1953 with 12 members in the historic Chapel, the choir has grown to more than 160 singers. Through the years, the Chancel Choir has provided music for worship, support for activities and ministries in the church, and outreach projects for the community. Here is a brief look at some recent activities and the impressions of some new members.

#### Young Composer Thanks Choir With Special Music

Receiving the Chancel Choir Scholarship in 2001 did more than help Daniel Vendt receive his bachelor's degree in music composition this May. It motivated him to write a special composition for the choir based on Psalm 31.

"I was so surprised to receive the scholarship. There were lots of my friends competing," Daniel says. His undergraduate degree from Illinois Wesleyan University has prepared him for his ultimate dream – a Master's Degree in Film and Television Music from the Royal College of Music in London.

Meanwhile, one of Daniel's films he wrote, directed and composed was featured in the St. Louis Film Festival in July.

Kristie says the choir now is her extended family. "Because of my job, we went 23 years without establishing couple friends. Now we have people to be with and places to go," she says.

But, even with these life changing experiences, Kristie says her favorite part of being in the choir is still the music. "My father is a singer. Every time I hear a piece of music my father sang in church, I think of my parents. It helps me worship and I know we help others worship, too."

## Music Brings Catholic Back to Church

For a life-long Catholic, it was the music that brought him back to church – the Methodist Church.

"I always wanted to try singing in a choir," Baritone Jim Descher said. "I just loved the sound and when I first heard this choir, well I fell in love with it and just had to try."

Soon Jim realized that being part of a large church choir was more than attending rehearsal and sitting in the loft on Sunday morning. "I joined in 2000 right after my dad became very ill and then died. Without a doubt, it was the choir that helped me. They just adopted me. The

phone never stopped ringing. Cards arrived by the basketful."

It was then that Jim decided to put "a little more into it" by volunteering to be a choir officer and getting involved in helping with projects.



Jim says being a part of the choir has enhanced his family's lives. "I can't think of a better small group within the church to join – people who love being around each other and making music together."

## Missionary Reaches Out To Choir Members

A desire to get acquainted in a new place drove Tenor Dick Vreeland directly to the church's music room soon after moving to St.

Soprano Sue Sturhahn's daughter had met a young woman who had lost her job and become homeless. She couldn't provide for her children and was about to lose her car.


Sue asked the choir for help. A quick collection raised \$1,400 – more than the \$400 needed to save the car. The rest paid rent and utility bills.

The woman now has a fulltime job, has bought a condo and joined a small area church. She is doing well. spent working with Methodist missionaries throughout the world. Making new friends quickly is the name of their game.

"I thought the size of the church was most impressive. The largest church I had belonged to before moving here was a congregation of 450. Always before, I would feel guilty to be gone from the choir loft if I was one of a handful of tenors. But here with 20 tenors, it's not so much a problem," he said.

Dick believes the annual overnight choir retreats are one of the most important activities for new members. "I immediately knew many people in the choir after my first retreat. It's a great way to become bonded," he said.

When Dick's wife was killed in a tragic automobile accident, the choir offered his family the support he says they needed. "The choir sang for the congregation on the Sunday of Peg's


