Fall Follies Showcases Church Talent

The evening started with an enthu-I siastic audience talking to a video screen and ended with more than 70 performers bowing in front of a standing ovation.

In between, talented members and friends of Manchester United Methodist Church did their best to prove that talent was alive and well in our congregation. The MUMC Fall Follies Music Revue was pro-

duced by the Chancel Choir Nov. 7 as a fund raiser for its scholarship and community outreach activities More than \$7,000 was raised during the performance As more than 700

persons watched. dancers, singers, acrobats, clowns, and instrumentalists performed 28 acts during the two-hour show.

Prior to the revue, a special pre-show party for patron tick-

et holders was held in Old Fellowship Hall. Joe Elstner provided piano entertainment for more than 20 patrons enjoying a dessert buffet.

The show was directed by Bill Borger with the help of dozens of volunteers from the Chancel Choir. Planning for the revue began in April with an organizational meeting and

duty assignments. Auditions were held in September and rehearsals continued up to the night before the performance.

Talent shows are not new to our church. In the late 80s and early 90s, the MUMY Revue was produced as a fund raiser for the church's youth

reprise of that show. The idea for the Fall Follies came from a discussion about choir fundraising projects. The choir's ad hoc marketing team took the proposal for the Follies to the choir officers for approval last spring and the rest is show biz history.

As of the end of November, show revenue totaled just over \$9,000. Expenses stood at \$988 with net profit at \$8,100. According to choir treasurer John Lemen, some expenses still remain to be paid. Once they are paid and our traditional 10 percent tithe is paid to the church, net proceeds from the Follies should be about \$7,200.

Plans do call for talent shows to be a regular part of the choir's fundraising options however when the next Follies is produced is up for discussion.

Fundraisers Bring Choir Treasury Into Black

The success of both the Fall Follies and 100 Years of Broadway concerts has returned the choir's treasury to financial health. As of Nov.26, the balance in the choir member activity account was \$10,624.62.

When this report was prepared, final Fall Follies accounting had not been completed.

To simplify accounting, choir treasurer John Lemen has set up four sub accounts to track funds. Balances of those accounts are shown below. The Choir Fundraising sub account is the main account for the choir's members money. The activity sub account is used to pay expenses. As needed, "pass through" sub accounts are set up to track money for specific

projects such as Fall Follies and the Fall Retreat.

Negative balances are shown in two of the sub accounts. A total of \$398 was paid to the retreat center for rooms reserved that were not used at the retreat this year. Choir officers voted to write off the loss at their meeting Dec. 12. Also, a \$1500 deposit for use of Mercy Center in 2005 was paid from the choir member account.

Officers were undecided if member activity funds or church music ministry funds should be used to finance the retreat deposit for 2005.

A previous policy on use of choir member funds will be revised by the choir treasurer and presented to officers for review.



The previous policy outlined appropriate uses for choir member funds and set in place a process for choir members to approve large expenditures.

Operational expenses for the chancel choir are provided through church music ministry funds. Member activity funds raided by fund raising projects are spent at the discretion and approval of the choir.



Plans are beginning to come together for the choir's tour to Indianapolis in June.

It will be a weekend of great music and family fun. "Indy's a cool place for our trip and an awesome place for families to play," Kevin says.

The trip will begin with departure for Indy on Friday, June 11 either by chartered coach or personal vehicle.

During the day on Saturday, June 12, there will be many options for fun things to do, including: Indy's new Circle Centre (mega shopping), the Zoo, White River State Park, Indiana State Museum and Imax, the Indiana State Capitol, and the Indy World War Memorial. The choir takes a midwestern tour every other year and has visited Chicago, Kansas City and Nashville.

Retreat Again To Dittmer


